PAN-AFRICAN MEETING SPIRITAN SUPERIORS AND FORMATORS

he Superiors and representatives of formators of the Spiritan Circumscriptions in Africa and the Islands met Sept. 01-05 at the Spiritan International School of Theology (SIST) Enugu, Nigeria. In Africa, there are three Provinces, Angola, Nigeria, EAP and the five Foundations, WAF, FAC, SCAF, FCK(Foundation of Congo Kinshasa) FOI. All were represented except WAF which could not attend because of flight problems. Fr Godfrey Odigbo represented the General Council.

Previous Meetings

The first Pan-African Conference of Spiritans took place in

Nigeria in March 1974. The theme Indigenisation of Spiritan Charism in Africa aimed at seeing how African Spiritans can live the Christian and Spiritan life as realties incarnated in authentic African values – to be truly Africans and truly Spiritans. It was resolved to hold the conference every second year. A secretary was elected for two years.

The second meeting took place in Yaounde in Cameroun in December, 1976. The meeting, scheduled for Dakar in 1979, did not take place. No further meetings were held until June 1986 when, under the auspices of the Generalate, a meeting of African

Provinces and Foundations was organised in Saverne, France. There were 16 participants.

In 1988, a fourth meeting was hosted in Langata, Nairobi by EAP. Before this meeting all African Spiritans were asked to complete a questionnaire describing their own experiences in living the *Vow of Poverty*. The objective was to help to inculturate the *Vow of Poverty* in the African context.


The fifth meeting took place in Brazzaville, Congo in 1990. Based on the responses given to the questionnaire in Langata, it reflected on the inculturation of the *Vow of*

Poverty in the Spiritan formation houses in Africa and the Islands.

The sixth meeting was convened in Ejisu, Ghana, in July 1993. The general theme was Formation and Mission - which formation for which mission? The content was considered under various aspects such as J. & P., Interreligious Dialogue in Africa and the Formation of Formators.

The seventh meeting was held in Bethlehem, South Africa, in November 1995. There, Fr. Edmund Ndzana, FAC, was elected as a permanent coordinating secretary. The meeting dealt with the Rationalisation of

Structures of Formation in Cicumscriptions in Africa and the Islands. It also considered Spiritan Formation in the Light of the Synod on Africa, the New Guide for Spiritan Formation and J. & P. Following the orientations of the EGC95, Dakar, the meeting discussed setting up Spiritan Centres for on-going formation, especially in the area of Spiritan spirituality, in Bagamoyo (Tanzania) and SIST (Nigeria). The next meeting was scheduled to take place in September 1997 in Zaire (Democratic Republic of Congo). However, because of the unsettled situation in that country, the venue was later changed to Nigeria.

The meeting in SIST, gave its blessing to the exchange of staff and students among the member circumscription as was recommended in the South African meeting. Much had happened within the previous two years. A number of students from WAF and Nigeria are doing their second cycle in the houses of formation of FAC and EAP. Some students of FAC have done their pastoral experience in Nigeria and WAF and will do their second cycle in SIST. Some students of FOI and SCAF are also doing their second

cycle in EAP. Some formators have been made available by Nigeria for formation in SCAF and FAC. This trend was seen and encouraged among the circumscriptions as an expression of internationality and solidarity

The acute shortage of formators for the African Provinces and Foundations was painfully felt by the delegates. This led to more pointed discussions on the establishment of Spiritan Centres as proposed in the previous meeting in South Africa. These centres will be for the training of formators, especially in Spiritan missionary spirituality and heritage, and will offer other members opportunity for on-going formation and renewal. The centres as places of spiritual renewal could eventually be open to non-Spiritans who might be interested in our spirituality. The two centres (SIST and Bagamoyo) were approved in line with the deliberation of the previous meeting in South Africa.

Spiritan Centres: SIST and Bagamoyo

It was considered that a Spiritan centre in SIST could use the existing structures and facilities. If approved by the Governing Council of SIST and the General Council, the course could begin in the next academic year in a simple way with three or four formators drawn from SIST and some visiting specialists in Spiritan studies.

Bagamoyo was chosen because of its historical importance for the Spiritans and the church in East Africa. The Spiritans landed there in 1863 and from there began the evangelisation of East Africa. It has a rich historical and missionary museum and a Marian shrine. The building

plans for the proposed structures in Bagamoyo were studied. The meeting agreed that work could be started there in phases beginning with an administrative block and a permanent structure for the museum, as soon as funds are available. It is hoped that the Conference will learn from the experience of SIST before courses are started in Bagamoyo. It was underlined that both Centres from the beginning should be bilingual and open to confreres from the various regions. Meanwhile, following the recommendations of the meeting in South Africa, the meeting commissioned a feasibility study for another centre in a francophone area. This will be considered at the next meeting.

Education

The apostolate of education, formal and informal, as an important aspect of our Spiritan charism and heritage in Africa, was also discussed. Each circumscription was advised to give it a place of importance in its missionary priorities and in its personnel planning in the years to come. The issues of lack of sufficient funds for running the formation houses and the inability to attain financial self-reliance were considered as sources of major concern for member circumscriptions.

Following the resignation of Edmund Ndzana as the secretary shortly after the last meeting, Fr. Gerard Nnamunga, EAP, was elected unanimously as the permanent secretary for a mandate of four years.

The next meeting will take place in two years time in Congo Kinshasa in the last week of August, 1999.

Ethiopia: Silver Jubilee

he mission to Ethiopia had in a sense been anticipated when in the 1940s Fr Devenish of Trinidad, at the request of Rome, came from Tanganyika

with a small group of Spiritans to replace Italian missionaries after the victory of the Allies in Ethiopia. (cf Spiritan News, 55, Jan/Feb 1985) This was purely a temporary arrangement.

The General Chapter of 1968 had recommended a new impetus towards first evangelization. An international community was set up,

which found in the Borana their "people of election" while the Irish Province set up another group in the province then called Gamo Gofa, where, for the first time ever, our Congrega-

ever, our Congregation met with the Christian East. The Ethiopians and the Ethiopian Catholic Church, particularly in the North and in the Capital, have also benefited enormously from our confreres' dedicated work in Famine Relief and in Development.

Today there are signs that we have become rooted in the Ethiopian soil. Several candidates to Spiritan life are knocking at our door and

Missionaries

Apart from a few exceptions, the only genuine collaborators to have given service and what is more, over many years, are the religious, both male and female. I have never seen one of them returning with their pockets full of money.

No religious ever made a fortune in Africa. It simply does not happen.

They return home poor and worn out.

Very often they have nothing but a house of retirement as a place to stay where, after having spent ten, twenty, thirty years or more of disinterested service, they can hide their old age, illnesses and death.

What self-sacrifice!

I find that they do not blow their own trumpet.
They are not bought or bribed.

I feel that an Africa solid and responsible can be built by people of that quality.
Whether they are lay or religious is of little importance provided they are people capable of committing themselves completely and of inspiring respect for their competence, devotion and honesty.

Professor Gentilini was head of the tropical unit at Pitié-Salpêtrière Hospital in Paris. It was with him that Spiritans who had returned from the Missions began systematic help check-ups. Many other Congregations followed suite. Many Spiritans owe to him the fact that they are still on the Missions. Professor Gentilini is the present president of the French Red Cross.

Publications

In preparation for the official national celebrations on Aug. 15-16, 1997, both groups came together and prepared a number of publications in order to present the Spiritan way of life to a wider public. Leaflets in English and Amharic were distributed and a colour booklet of over fifty pages, *Spiritans: Ethiopia, 1972-1997*, was published. This booklet contains a wide variety of articles expressing the motivations and experiences of both the Borana and Gamo Gofa Groups.

National Celebrations

Celebrations took place in Addis Ababa over two days and were hosted by the Capuchins of Holy Saviour parish. Highlights were the Official Opening and the Jubilee Eucharist in the Ethiopian Rite. Cardinal P. Tzadua presided at both.

A particularly significant event was the Response by His Grace Archbishop Timotheos of the Ethiopian Orthodox Church to two presentations Evangelization in Gamo Gofa by Fr Brian O'Toole, CSSp. and The task of the Catholic Church in Ethiopia by Prof. Ernst Chr. Suttner, Vienna. It was the first time that an Orthodox bishop had addressed a Catholic gathering in Ethiopia.

Two Appeals

Algeria

If you are free to do a sabbatiacal year beginning in September 1998...If you enjoy relatively good health...If you speak French and maybe arabic (which would be a plus)...If you feel that you can make a radical break from your professional or pastoral work which is too absorbing...If you do not fear having a lot of free time for prayer and reflection and eventually to give courses in either English or French and most especially for meeting people...If you want, as a member of a minority Church, to have the experience of meeting everyday with muslims...If you accept to live in community with a confrere, a bit shockproof from having lived this experience for 26 years but who is ready to do everything to make life pleasant...

Then tell the Superior of your circumscription and contact me. You will thus permit Raymond Gonnet to take a year's recyclage as well as a rest. You will help the 'Groupe d'Algerie' to survive and to get over a difficult period caused by events of which you are aware. It is not feasible to send first appointments at this time to Algeria. The choice has its risks, more perhaps for the mind than for the body, but the deep spiritual joy of living in solidarity with a people and a Church which is suffering as well as the support of the fraternity and the prayers of Spiritan confreres, will not fail you.

Ethiopia: Apostolate among the Gomo Gofa.

The Irish group (or Gomu Gofa group) of Ethiopia is characterised by its type of evangelisation - with and through the Ethiopian Orthodox Church. This Church is widely spread in the area and it qualifies as a "sister Church" of the Catholic Church. The apostolate is therefore geared towards both the renewal of this Church and accompanying it in its effort to reach out to the people living according to their African traditional religion, particularly the Hammer. This type of apostolate is unique in the world. It is supported by the Congregation and the Pontificial Council for promoting Christian Unity. In addition, an important programme of development is presently being restructured.

The group is at present attempting to give due attention to some young people, mostly from an Ethiopian-rite background, requesting entry to the Congregation. Two of us are involved in a formation programme, common to all Religious, at the Major Seminary of Addis Ababa.

Our particular problem, is our extremely small number. Should someone be interested in such an apostolate in the context of the Ethiopian rite tradition, with a dimension of development work and a commitment to help building up community life, please contact both your Superior and the person responsible for the group.

"Eight hundred young Religious, men and women, born after 1967, among whom were four Spiritans, met, in Rome, Sept. 29-Oct. 04, 1997. Participants came from the five Continents. There were five official languages - English, Italian, German, Spanish and French. The meeting was organised by the Union of Superiors General.

The following were among the topical questions: can one be a religious without living in community? Do our Congregations cut themselves off from the poor because of their riches? Could our training be more attuned to the modern world? Depending on whether we are still discerning our vocation or have already made a permanent commitment, expectations may not always be the same. One thing however, is certain. We value our elders and we wish to guide the bark together with them - to be a hope for the world of today" (Jean-Pascal Lombart).

- Fr Jean-Pierre Gaillard, French Province, has been appointed **Permanent Secretary** for the European Region. He will reside at the community in Brussels.
- St. Thérèse of Lisieux was declared a Doctor of the Church on Sunday Oct. 19, 1997. There are 33 Doctors of the Church among whom are 3 women - SS Teresa of Avila, Catherine of Siena and Thérèse of Lisieux who is also Patroness of Auteuil.
- Fr Schouver represented the Union of Superiors General at the eleventh **SECAM Plenary Assembly**, Sept. 21-28, 1997. This was the first to be held in South Africa. Among the topics discussed were *the Church as Family* and *the Need to Restructure SECAM*.
- Celebrations: In June this year the Spiritans celebrated the centenary of our arrival in Tefé. In October, Mauritius celebrated the 150th anniversary of the foundation of the Diocese of Port-Louis. There will be an account of these celebrations in the next issue.
- On Oct 01, 1997, membership of the Congregation was 3,081 comprising 31 Bishops, 254 Brothers, 2,373 Priests and 423 Junior Professed.
- Fr Paddy Roe, Ireland and Kenya, came to the Generalate on Oct.19, 1997 to help in the preparatory work for the General Chapter. He will be in Rome until Dec.19, 1997.
