- CONSTITUTIONAL BRICOLAGE. By *Gerald Garvey*. Princeton: Princeton University Press, 1971. Pp. xi, 160. \$7.50. This book is a blending of anthropological and exchange theory, offering a new interpretation of American constitutional development, and a review of the history of the Supreme Court in light of the bricolage theory.
- FIFTY-EIGHT LONELY MEN. By *J. W. Peltason*. Urbana: The University of Illinois Press, 1971. Pp. 288. \$2.95. Originally published in 1961, this book illustrates the role of the judiciary, especially the Southern Federal Judges, in school desegregation, and in the solution of this social and political problem.
- LAW AGAINST THE PEOPLE. Edited by *Robert Lefcourt*. New York: Vintage Books, 1971. Pp. x, 400. \$2.45. An anthology of radical views on law is presented by the editor with the purpose of "demystification of the law."
- NO-FAULT INSURANCE. By *Willis Park Rokes*. Santa Monica: Insurors Press, Inc., 1971. Pp. xxi, 416. \$12.50. The author attempts to present a complete and impartial analysis of this controversial insurance plan.
- TRIAL DIPLOMACY. By *Alan E. Morrill*. Chicago: Court Practice Institute, 1971. Pp. xxix, 1174. \$17.50. (Paperback). This is a new text and casebook prepared exclusively for law school trial practice courses.
