THE AGONIZING CHOICE: BIRTH CONTROL, RELIGION AND THE LAW. By *Norman St. John-Stevas*. London: Eyre & Spottiswoode, 1971. Pp. 340. £ 3.50. The author surveys the question of birth control from the earliest times to the present, and discusses the legal aspects, both past and present, of birth control in Britain and the United States.

THE BILL OF RIGHTS: A DOCUMENTARY HISTORY. By *Bernard Schwartz*. New York: Chelsea House Publishers, 1971. Pp. Vol. I-xvii, 1-626; Vol. II-ix, 627-1234. \$. The author presents a documentary history of the federal Bill of Rights, beginning with the English antecedents, and concluding with the ratification by the states.

GREAT COURT-MARTIAL CASES. By *Joseph DiMona*. New York: Grosset & Dunlap Publishers, 1972. Pp. xi, 291. \$6.95. The author examines twelve courts-martial cases, selected for their legal significance and historical importance, as examples of the way in which military trials have changed military law and affected the course of our history.

THE JUSTIFICATION OF THE LAW. By *Clarence Morris*. Philadelphia: University of Pennsylvania Press, 1971. Pp. 214. \$12.50. In this presentation of "a theory of justice," Professor Morris examines the logic of law, the need for general rules of law, the function of sociological insights in the development of common law, and the role of statutory penal law.
